Faith and Restoration

Luke 8:40-56

Main Point

Those who have true faith in Jesus will be restored.

I. Exposition

A. A Woman with a Hemorrhage

- 1. Around the time Jairus' daughter was born, this woman began to hemorrhage (likely a uterine hemorrhage).
 - a) Her standing in society was marred with shame.
 - b) To touch Jesus would be to cause Him to be ceremonially unclean (cf. Leviticus 15:25ff).
- 2. She spent money on physicians who in the end could do nothing for her (note Luke, a physician, observing this fact).
- 3. She reasoned that if Jesus could heal Jairus' daughter, He could heal her.
 - a) She reached out to touch the hem of His garment and was immediately healed.
 - b) What human physicians could not do for her for 12 years was instantaneously done by Jesus.
- 4. Jesus asked a question that in His divine nature He knew the answer to: "Who touched Me?"
 - a) The woman did not initially respond, perhaps out of embarrassment.
 - b) Peter believed Jesus' question to be preposterous, considering people were thronging to Christ and everyone was bumping into him on the journey.
 - c) Jesus recognized that His healing power went forth, and wanted to make take this moment to once more demonstrate His ability.
- 5. The woman admits to Jesus that she touched Him with the faith that He would heal her simply by touching the hem of His garment (cf. Mal. 4:2).
- 6. Jesus proclaims: "Be of good cheer; your faith has made you well."

B. Jairus' Daughter Raised to Life

- 1. Jairus was a ruler of the synagogue, likely meaning that he helped with the organization of the synagogue services, of maintaining the synagogue building, etc.
- 2. He humbly falls down at the feet of Jesus and begs Him to heal his twelve-year-old daughter (Luke notes that this was his *only* daughter).
 - a) He had *faith* that Jesus could heal his daughter of her grave illness.

- b) He understood that he was at the mercy of Jesus' decision whether or not to come.
- 3. Jesus agrees, but as they approach the house someone comes up bringing the sad news: Jairus' daughter is dead, thus there was not need bothering the Rabbi any longer since *there was nothing else that could be done*.
- 4. Jesus observes that there are two things Jairus must do: (1) not fear, and (2) believe in the power of Jesus to raise his daughter from the dead.
- 5. Jesus only permitted the "inner circle" to see the miracle He was about to perform.
- 6. He then makes the "ridiculous" claim that the girl was only *sleeping*. This claim brought scorn from the people within the house.
- 7. Jesus commanded the dead girl's body to arise and from the dead the girl obeyed, coming back to life.
 - a) Bringing the dead back to life is impossible for man, but it is clearly possible for God (cf. Luke 1:37).
 - b) In the same way that the Creator of the universe brought life to all things (Gen. 1; 2:7), Jesus, the Second Person of the Godhead, brought life to that girl.
 - c) Paul, understanding the power of Christ to bring life to the dead may have had this very account in mind when he wrote about God bringing life to the *spiritually dead* (Eph. 2:1ff).
- 8. The Healer then commanded that the girl's parents tell no one about the event.

II. Truths

- A. Jesus has the power to deliver the helpless.
- B. Believers have confidence in Jesus' purpose and plan.
